

the gospel of Luke is where we get most of our Nativity pictures from and is the source of some of the songs we still use to worship 2,000 years after they were written. Luke tells us of the birth of John the Baptist and records the song his father Zechariah sang at his birth, a song of praise to God and one of prophecy about what this child would do as one who prepares the

nunciation to Mary that she will bear God's Son. We will sing it with her throughout the Christmas cycle at the end of Communion.

Then Luke brings us the angels' song to the shepherds: Glory to God in the highest! We will sing it in various forms and settings at the Christmas worship services.

The final song in Luke is sung by Simeon when he and Anna, who have been waiting in the Temple to see God's promised salvation, are finally rewarded when Mary and Joseph bring Jesus to the Temple when he is six weeks old (Feb. 2). We will hear about his temple visit then and when he was twelve on Dec. 30, and sing Simeon's song in February.

This year we also celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany on a Sunday, which commemorates that other Christmas scene, the Star and the Magi, and because we have the opportunity to do that this year, we will sing parts of their song as offertory during the Advent and Christmas seasons, culminating in the whole thing on January 6. Matthew's Gospel brings us this story.

One theologian has called this feast of hymns in Luke that celebrate the coming of God's kingdom "Singing in the Reign." May our voices join with those of the saints of old in doing just that.

Campaign to reduce mortgage debt slated

We will be conducting a capital campaign from December 9th through January 27th. All funds raised will be used to pay down the mortgage and refinance the remaining balance. We borrowed approximately \$150,000 from the Mission Investment Fund to finance our building transformation. The mortgage is a 20 year loan with the option to refinance if we make a large prepayment. Our goal is to raise \$50,000 which would lower our monthly loan payment by over \$300 and allow us to increase the budget for ministry and mission.

Members and friends of Advent are invited to participate by noting "capital campaign" on your check or offering envelope. We can also accept donations of stocks, bonds or other investments. The campaign will last through January so that contributors have the option to donate in either 2012 or 2013. All contributions are 100% tax deductible. Watch our progress on the capital campaign "thermometer" in the narthex! If you have any questions, please see Finance Minister Rensford Lovell or me.

Highlights from the November meeting



- During November, Pastor Anna attended a number of Synod-wide events that included the installation of two pastors and the Bishop's Convocation in Williamsburg. She also hosted the Potomac Conference monthly meeting.
- Roxie Jairrels reported that the Game Day event was successful and exceeded her expectations in both participation and donations. The event raised \$681.00. Roxie hopes to make it an annual event, maybe even a bi-annual event.
- Financial Secretary Paul Hetzer reported that there was no building user income for the month of October, and miscellaneous income of \$394 was received for Game Day.
- Treasurer Ellie Holsopple reported that receipts were almost \$3,000 below the average per month in the first quarter. About 40% of the Missioning/Outreach budget, 86% of the Building Maintenance budget, and 53% of the Landscaping Maintenance budget have been spent. Overall, General Budget expenditures year-to-date were 3% under budget but exceeded receipts.
- The average attendance for October was 36.
- The Audit Committee submitted its report and recommended a twoperson control over and chain of custody for the Sunday collection plate, which Debbie Lewis has already established. Paul Hetzer will train the new and current counters to make sure there is consistency.
- A motion was made and passed that Advent participate in "the Journey." Linda Vilardo and Desiree Jessimy, along with Pastor Anna, are willing to represent Advent.
- Advent will have a decorating party with a potluck (finger food) lunch after worship on December 16. Coordinator is Desiree Jessimy.
- For Epiphany, Advent will have an un-decorating party with a King's cake and festive music on January 06.


More than 100 joined in annual service of thanksgiving

A little book about a small church's big miracle

What's on the shelf in Advent's library

ne of the smallest books in our library is about a very small but mighty church in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada. In 1970, the church appeared to be dying, but the few people hanging on to keep it alive decided through prayer that God wanted them to try one more time. Written by Henry Blackaby, their pastor from 1970-82, this book is a brief story about that small church and its search for God's will and their mission. It is "an account of what happened when the people of this church heard what the Spirit was saying to them and obeyed. They saw God accomplish things that could be explained only in terms of His divine presence and activity." Blackaby believes the churches where God's will is done on earth are those that have learned to "hear" God and that when we hear God's call and respond appropriately, there will be no limit to what God can and will do through us. Lest this article become longer than the book, I'll stop here and suggest you read it for yourself.


Letters and news from afar...






This holiday season, "spread" some cheer by giving a yummy treat that can be spread on crackers, bread or apple slices.

What you need:

- ½ cup chopped, crushed candied pecans
- ½ cup chopped fresh basil
- ½ cup chopped dried cranberries
- ¼ tsp. black pepper
- 8 oz. goat cheese log
- Decorative plastic wrap
