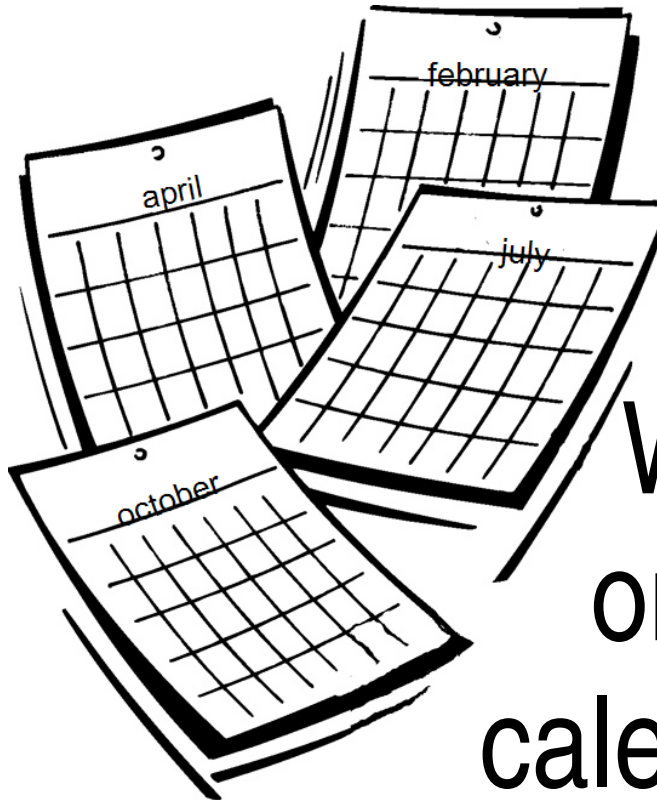

“Called” to service

You have everything you need for the task

I read today that the phrase “dialing the telephone” is disappearing because telephones no longer have dials. Perhaps, though, you still get called mostly on the telephone, except that maybe it’s not the telephone but the iPhone. Or maybe you get texted a lot. Or maybe most of the requests for your time and attention come via email. Or maybe someone knocks on your door or stops by your desk. The ways we call people have morphed and expanded, but that hasn’t changed the situation of humans being called to service. When we get those calls, one of the first things a lot of us do is look for excuses not to volunteer. We may feel that we don’t have enough time right now or that we don’t have the experience, expertise or gifts to do the task. Even if the “headhunter” thinks we should apply for the job, we may feel that HR would reject us. Consider this hypothetical evaluation report Jesus may have gotten if he had vetted his disciples:

Council highlights from January

- * An artist and a craftsman had an initial meeting and agreed on ideas for stained glass in the narthex windows.
- * Financial Secretary Paul Hetzer reported that December receipts were strong at \$18,248.08. Treasurer Ellie Holsopple stated receipts exceeded disbursements by almost \$4,937, increasing the General Fund's balance to \$13,424 by the end of December. Benevolences were sent to the Synod at 9% and LSS at .9% of regular giving, \$391 more than our budget estimate for the month. \$13,300 remains in Bequest Funds.
- * The Council voted to separate the Property Maintenance and Property Supplies into sub-line items, one for the Building and one for Landscaping. This will permit more efficient management of the Building and Landscaping budgets.
- * Average attendance in December was 44. Christmas Eve attendance was 73.
- * Advent will be soliciting landscape design proposals from at least two firms, with special focus on the north side and rear of the property.
- * Additionally, Council voted to approve use of the fellowship hall for rehearsals by a theatre group twice a week. A decision was also made to have a survey done of the five-foot strip of land that borders the property of Advent's 22nd Street neighbor to be certain where the property line runs.

An update on the state of our finances

The finance committee met in mid-December to review our financial position after moving into our new building. Here are a few items of note:

- * Mortgage – The building renovation was financed by a bequest from Jan Johnson, proceeds from the Endowment Fund, contributions to the Building Transformation Fund, and a mortgage from the Mission Investment Fund. The loan has been amortized over 20 years and payments began on January 1st. We will continue to accept contributions to the Building Transformation Fund and will hold a capital campaign later this year. After the campaign, we will probably make a large prepayment and request a loan payment recalculation. If you are interested in assisting with the capital campaign, please speak to me or to council president, Marianne Hetzer.
- * Electronic Contribution Options – Vanco, our Simply Giving administrator, offers online and mobile options for contributions. We discussed pros and cons of various options (contributions through the website, automatic gifting with a debit or credit card, accepting electronic payments onsite, etc.) and decided to gather more information from members about interest in these services. If you believe that you would take advantage of these options if they were offered, please speak to me.
- * 2012 - 2013 Budget Process – I will start to gather input from Advent's leadership in early April. The finance committee will review a draft budget by early May and council will vote on the proposed budget at the May council meeting. These meetings will be open to all members and your input regarding possible expenditures for the coming fiscal year is welcome.
- * Bequest Funds – Bequests from Margie Draley, Yvonne Goodman and Joyce McKenzie were used to purchase furnishings for our new building. We will also be using bequest funds for landscaping expenses and some items for the adult forums. We are thankful for their generosity and faithfulness.

Sunday Forum, a Life Changer?

Why should you stay for Sunday Forum? To answer this question, look at how some forums have influenced members to participate in activities devoted to providing assistance to people in need.

After a past forum on the Offenders Aid and Restoration program, several Advent members became involved in a fixed time project that helped offenders learn to lead productive and responsible lives. After a Habitat for Humanity forum, one member actually signed up and went to El Salvador to help build houses there (as an added benefit to anyone who may be interested in participating in a Habitat for Humanity project, most of the expenses incurred are tax deductible). The forum on Lutheran Volunteer Corps resulted in members volunteering, attending events and donating to the organization's causes.

Before Christmas, a forum featured Empowered Women International, a non-profit organization that helps immigrant, refugee and low-income women in the Greater Washington DC Metro area channel their artistic and creative talents into a business of their own. Some members have followed up and become involved in the organization's efforts. And of course, we continue as a congregation to be involved in helping the Arlington Street People's Assistance Network feed the homeless in our area.

Through these activities, Advent members have helped individuals cope with and overcome difficult situations, while expanding their understanding of people different from themselves. So the next time you feel like leaving church right after cookies and coffee, reconsider and attend Sunday Forum. It may just change your life and the lives of others.

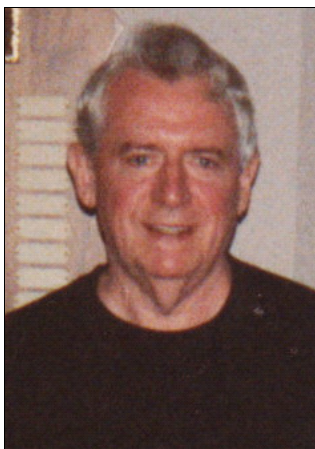

FORGIVENESS Game

Try this twist on musical chairs.

What you need:

- 28 large index cards
- Black marker
- Two teams of people
- Radio or CD player

What you do:

1. On index cards, write out *forgiveness*, one letter per card. Make two sets (two F's, two O's, etc.).
2. Mix up the cards and form them face up in a circle on the floor. (You'll have six blanks mixed in.)
3. Have teams mix themselves up and stand in a circle around the cards. Ask an extra person to turn the music on and off.
4. As the music plays, teams walk around the circle. When the music stops, players each pick up the card nearest them.
5. Team members take their cards to a designated area and try to spell forgiveness. Any double letters or blanks go back to the "music person," who reorganizes remaining cards, spacing them evenly into a fresh circle.
6. Play continues until one team spells *forgiveness*.

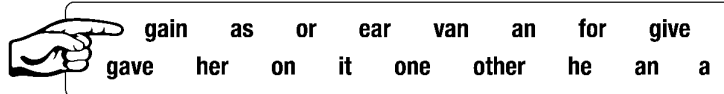

Let the needy walk in your shoes

Art for Humanity is collecting shoes to send to needy residents of Honduras. “A pair of used shoes allows a poor child to attend school and allows an adult to get a job. A pair of shoes also promotes better health through a reduction in soil borne parasites as well as infections from cuts. Your donation of good used shoes will make a **BIG** difference in the lives of the poor in Honduras, the second poorest country in the western hemisphere,” according the organization’s website, www.artforhumanity.org.

All types of good used shoes are very much needed - dress, casual, athletic, children, adults, heels, sandals, etc. Men shoes are the most needed, especially work boots. The main limit is size. We can only use up to size 11 for men and up to size 9 for women. Shoes can be dropped off at Advent or anytime 24/7 without notice on the front porch at 635 S. 25th St., Arlington, VA. 22202. No special packaging or sorting is needed... plastic trash bags are fine. Just be sure pairs match and go together in the same bag (tying laces together is helpful but not necessary as long as pairs are together).

In addition to shoes, the organization is also accepting clothing (all seasons, size large and smaller; youth and light weight most needed), linens, utilitarian items (pens, pencils, flashlights, umbrellas, candles, knives, scissors, etc.), and toys. Visit the website for a full list.

Thanks for more than \$1,700 to Gifts of Hope

Advent members purchased \$1,745 worth of Gifts of Hope this year, and the Arlington Chapter of Thrivent provided a match of \$780 for a total of \$2,525. These funds will be used to provide a camp scholarship to Caroline Furnace; adult education fees and programs for the homeless and the poor; respite for caregivers; salary support for a Lutheran pastor in El Salvador; books for at risk youth and adults in D.C. and seminary students in Namibia; wellness programs, as well as medical and dental care for the poor; language classes and Giant or Safeway gift cards for refugees; food, clothing, and transportation assistance for people in need; job skills coaching and tools; haircuts for job interviews; camping activities for teens with HIV/AIDS; in-home care for seniors; life story journals for the elderly; support for a Lutheran Volunteer Corps member; and seed money to help the Gettysburg Seminary convert to geothermal heating in its chapel and a high school in Namibia repair its broken sewer system. Thank you to the Advent members who made this year’s Gifts of Hope program so successful.
