Council will evaluate if new structure works best for our small congregation June! Besides pools and picnics and year-end celebrations, we at Advent close a "year" and begin another. We had our Annual Meeting on June 10, and our newly elected leaders will take office on July 1, all in accordance with our Constitution. In this political year we hear a lot about the rules and regulations as laid out in our US Constitution, and at our meeting, we had references to our Congregational Constitution. Churches tend to try to operate by consensus rather than by harsh legalisms, because we

Ellie Holsopple, Desiree Jessimy, Paul Hetzer, Rensford Lovell, Georges Toth and Ingrid Berdahl were appointed by the Council to their positions.

A leadership retreat is slated for August 4th.

A three-person audit team needs to be appointed to audit Advent's records after the close of the fiscal year on June 30th. Receipts in May exceeded disbursements by \$554, leaving the General Fund with a balance of \$16,848 at the end of the month. The Council voted to direct donations from building users from the Building Use Fund to the Building Transformation Fund. Those donations will be used to help reduce the mortgage loan balance.

There will be no Vacation Bible School this year, but planning for VBS in the summer of 2013 will begin in January of 2013.

Planning is underway for a Fall Festival to be held at Advent on Saturday, October 21st. Planning is also underway for organizing and displaying Advent's library. Landscape Minister Ingrid Berdahl will make a proposal to the Council in July for landscaping in the rear of the church.

Jesus, as we gather to worship you, help us value your gifts as signs that direct us to you and the life you give. We bless you today!

Sunday Forum



heed Christ's call for unity and harmony in our fellowship. So to avoid long drawn out procedures to amend the constitution when circumstances change, we adopt by-laws and continuing resolutions to fit an evolving situation.

At our meeting, we were addressing a change in the way the council organizes itself. In our constitution, an organization by committee structure is spelled out. When I arrived at Advent, the committees had disappeared and the council was functioning as a committee of the whole. This meant that council meetings went very long as everyone debated the details of snow removal contracts and picnic supplies and choosing Vacation Bible School curricula. Advent had embarked on a process called Mission Transformation, and in one of those training meetings, we

were presented with an alternative method for small congregations where the council made the big overall decisions but smaller task groups did the research and worked out details, and brought to the full council a proposal for action with a fleshed out plan for implementing it. The council could then ask questions, which the team might have to address in the next meeting if it had in-

sufficient information. Because of the different gifts of those on council, members could give their guidance to either the administrative mission or the program mission, whichever they felt called to. The idea is that either team might establish a task force of people on or off council who would take responsibility for action. They would then form their own teams for accomplishing the task, and the team would dissolve when its work was done. In the original concept, a council member was required to choose to work with either administration or program at the time of election. This quickly proved to be unnecessary and counterproductive and that formality was dropped in practice. The question the council was tasked with addressing this year is evaluation of the process by which the council's work gets done and how it will choose to "legalize" it.

As always, all of you are invited to be a part of this discussion and discernment! We give thanks for all our leadership at Advent, our past presidents, and all who work on program and mission in un-elected and un-sung positions.

Volunteers needed to verify financial records

The audit committee meets once in the fall (probably for 2-3 hours) to review Advent's financial records for the prior fiscal year. The committee reviews bank statements, invoices/vouchers, and counter's reports. The purpose of the audit is to verify that expenditures are properly authorized, receipts are accounted for and deposited, and that financial reports accurately reflect the church's financial situation. The committee then submits a written report to council (prior year's reports are available as an example). A financial background is nice, but not necessary. Attention to detail would be a plus. The library is open! Check out Advent's selection of offerings



Congratulations to Sam Matzner who will perform with the NSO National Trustees' Summer Music Institute Orchestra this summer!

The orchestra will perform two FREE concerts in the Kennedy Center Concert Hall -- at 6 pm on July 15 and July 29, 2012. While parking at the Kennedy Center is \$20, it is accessible by free Metro shuttle from the GW/Foggy Bottom stop. There is also some street parking.

The summer music institute is an intensive program offering professional-level performance experience for talented young musicians.

On April 15, the U.S. Army Orchestra held its annual concert featuring the winner of the orchestra's Young Artist Competition. THE WAY, THE TRUTH, THE LIFE


Play this game with a group of friends to remind you to follow Jesus.

What you need:

- Large space for running
- 3 jump ropes or 9 traffic cones

What you do:

- 1. Using jump ropes or traffic cones, form lines at both ends of the playing area. Also make a dividing line in the middle. Designate one side as "The Way" and the other as "The Truth." The center line is "The Life."
- 2. Choose one person to stand in the middle of the center line. He or she is the caller, yelling, "The way!" or "The truth!" or "The life!" The rest of the players also start on the middle line.
- 3. When a location is called, players run as fast as possible to the designated area. The last person to arrive switches places with the caller.
- 4. When "The Life" is called, players run to the center line and raise both hands. No one gets out.

- Boxes (treasure chests)


What you do:

Locations Treasure Hunt

- 2. Write each verse on aself-stick note and hide allbut the first clue. Give the first clue to the player(s).
- 3. Leave the treats at the final clue destination.

Object Treasure Hunt

- 1. Find Bible verses that mention objects that can be found nearby. The object for Matthew 16:19, for example, is a key.
- 2. Give each player an empty box, a Bible and a list of verses as clues.
- 3. Have players return their collected items for a final prize.
